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


Mural Dedication

A New Shed on the K-2 Playground

A new garden shed was constructed over the summer by parent Brian Monteleone [along with help from other parents and Mr. Scott from the Kindergarten team, but really mostly Brian :-)]. The shed was designed by Aaron and Calder Wilson, of Wilson Architects and will soon have a living roof courtesy of parent Emilio Ancaya of Living Roofs who also installed the living components on the roof of the new cob oven.



The shed materials were paid for using part of a \$20K grant from the Faile Foundation, which the PTO applied for and received last year in order to make some physical improvements to our campus.

We are really, truly grateful for all of the work that Brian put in over the summer. He put in

many, many hours of work and also had to get creative to keep the costs down and stay within the original estimates. Not an easy task!

The PTO is also continuing to work on getting two shade structures constructed for both the K-2 and 3-5 playground areas. For this, the PTO will be combining funds from the Foundation grant with funds from the Bight IDEAS board. A similar partnership was used to fund the

construction of the earth (cob) oven last spring. Look for further details on shade construction in the coming months, and a big thank you to Bright IDEAS for partnering with the PTO on so many great projects.

Isaac Dickson's Rooftop Solar Project Receives Approval from School Board Fundraising goal of \$220,000 has also been achieved

On June 26, 2018, the Asheville City Schools Board of Education approved two measures that the Isaac Dickson PTO has been working on and advocating for over the last 1-2 years. The first was approval of a no cost lease option for Isaac Dickson Solar, LLC to place 600 kWatts of solar photovoltaic (PV) panels on the roof of the school as an investment in renewal energy. The LLC will own and be responsible for the panels for a period of approximately seven years after which ownership will transfer to Asheville City Schools at no cost.

The second measure was a request to invest a Duke Energy rebate check provided to the district into the solar PV array project. This rebate was provided by Duke because of energy efficiencies already in place at our school. This rebate helped accelerate our fundraising

timeline, which had already benefitted from a \$110,000 matching grant offered by an anonymous donor in May 2017.

The PTO launched a fundraising campaign in April 2017 in partnership with the Green Built Alliance to raise part of the overall cost of the array through charitable donations. The ultimate cost of the 600 kWatt rooftop system is around \$1 million, with \$220,000 coming from the fundraising campaign and about \$800,000 from private investors. For the charitable contributions, donations have been accepted through the Green Built Alliance's Appalachian Offsets program (cutmycarbon.org). Businesses and individuals who make a tax deductible donation to cutmycarbon.org also offset their own carbon footprint by contributing to a local green energy project (in this case, the Isaac Dickson's roof top solar

array). In addition to making Isaac Dickson Elementary one of the first carbon neutral schools in the Southeast, the solar panels will ultimately save Asheville City Schools over \$3.5 million in energy costs over their lifetime. The rooftop panels will likewise prevent the emission of approximately 1,000,000 lbs (450 tonnes) of CO2 each year.

Installation is planned for the summer of 2019 by Sundance Power Systems. Green Built Alliance will continue to collect donations for the Isaac Dickson solar project via the offsets program <u>cutmycarbon.orq</u> for the time being in an effort to ensure that the timeline that private investors need to own the array to get a return on their investment does not exceed 7 years. The solar panels have a lifetime of at least 30 years.

In Memoriam

Peggy Genova or (Ms. G) began her career in education supporting special needs students at a small high school in Bend, Oregon. In 1996 after moving back to North Carolina with her family of four she decided to go back to school to pursue a formal degree in education, obtaining her NC teaching license and a masters in elementary education.

Peggy's first teaching career was in Buncombe County Schools at Black Mountain Elementary. She developed the "Kids on the Run" program for 4th grade and after the first year other teachers began implementing the program to encourage students' physical fitness. In the program, students ran laps on the playground to work up to a marathon (26.2 miles) by the end of the year!

Peggy began teaching at Isaac Dickson in 2008 and was a teacher and friend to hundreds of students and dozens of teachers at Dickson. Bringing in her love of the outdoors and her passion for addressing social justice, her classroom was filled with a love of learning, laughter, equity, and empowerment. From organizing a class performance of Adele's "Hello",

Marching Against Racism, incorporating experiential education with Outward Bound's 4 Pillars, Peggy created a

supportive classroom environment and had an endless amount of compassion and love for her students. Her "supernova's" as she called her students were an inspiration to her as much as she was to them. In 2015, Peggy pushed for the allotment of several teacher scholarships to attend a NC Outward **Bound Educators** Course. Since then, 6 teachers from Isaac Dickson have participated in the NC Outward Bound Educators Initiative-4 awarded in scholarship by NCOBS and 2 funded by the Isaac Dickson PTO, which will maintain the scholarship for future

teacher participation.



The school is also in the early planning stages to create an outdoor learning space in her honor.



Peggy will always be in the hearts of the students she has taught and the teachers she has known. Her wisdom will serve to enlighten us all who strive to teach with compassion and help us to empower the free spirits in our classrooms.

The dedication marked the end of a year-long process that began last fall with a matching grant application to the Asheville City Schools Foundation to supplement a grant earmarked from the PTO.

The Artist for the project, Ernie Mapp, attended the listening sessions along with Daniel Suber who helped



facilitate these sessions as well as the eventual hands on work with our students. About 15 elders came to the sessions, several of whom also addressed the 3rd and 5th grades classes last March just before the art work with the kids began.


